Foreword

Dear Member

Innovation in community energy is very much the theme this month with news of an exciting project called **Tower Power**, a pilot project in Edinburgh aiming to put disadvantaged tenants in control of their energy. Innovation is also to the fore in Orkney where we're exploring ways in which community generators could meet some of the energy demand on inter-island ferries and assisting Orkney Islands Council with a **low-carbon ferries study**. Good news this month on our **joint wind project** with Berwickshire Housing Association which has reached construction stage with work beginning on the access track last month. Our share in this project will in time generate funds for our charitable work and help to keep the charity sustainable in the longer term. Garve and District Community Energy in Wester Ross are taking forward a **home energy scheme** designed to help local residents address their energy needs. On the energy demand side, we're also leading a **Third Sector Energy Focus** project to support third sector organisations across Scotland with their energy issues. Read more below.

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Members' news

Horshader: Rural Support and Connect

Horshader Development Company in the Western Isles are energy generators with their community-owned wind turbine. With part-funding from Scottish Government and Big Lottery they run a rural transport and handyman service to the community called 'Support and Connect'. The scheme has over 166 members and employs a fulltime driver/handyman and a part-time adminstrator. The group are now training their first team of volunteer drivers for their **community-owned minibus**. The training ensures basic proficiency in driving the minibus and passenger safety. Manager, Angela Macleod said "By having a pool of volunteers, willing to give their own time in service to their community, we are able to offer evening/weekend minibus services to the community as needed. This is our first team of volunteer drivers, with a second team being offered training later this month."

Borders: After the flood

Burnfoot, a housing estate in the north of Hawick, in the Scottish Borders is moving forward with plans for an **Anaerobic Digestion (AD)** project with the formation of a newly constituted group. They are also in discussions with the people developing the Hawick Flood Protection scheme with a view to installing heat distribution pipes alongside the new defence walls to simplify the installation.

Maximising benefit to Wester Ross communities

Garve and District Community Energy in Wester Ross have embarked on a **Home Energy Scheme** to help all local residents, thanks to funding from the Lochluichart Community Trust. The Trust was set up to administer Community Benefit funds associated with the Lochluichart Wind Farm. The Home Energy scheme led by Garve and District Community Energy, with support from Community Energy Scotland, is offering free home energy visits to local householders in the area to help identify suitable energy efficiency and renewable energy improvements, as well as providing information on funding through Scottish Government's home energy programmes. The home visits are being carried out by Home Energy Scotland's advisers. The Steering Group held a Warmer Homes Information Day at Garve Village Hall last month and will be running a similar event at Achnasheen Village Hall on 1 March. Another strand of the local Steering Group's work will be exploring the options for taking forward a community-led renewable energy project to benefit the wider community in the

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Orkney: Building Local Energy Economies

The <u>Surf 'n' Turf</u> project in Orkney sees us working with members Eday Renewable Energy (who run Eday's community-owned wind turbine) and several partners to establish a **hydrogen supply chain**. Once the system is running, their wind turbine will harness more energy and in turn raise more revenue. By providing its renewably-sourced hydrogen to a training facility, the foundations will also be in place for workers to gain the skills they need to use the hydrogen as transport fuel on land and sea.

Shipping is firmly the focus of the **Low-carbon Ferries research study** in which we are assisting Orkney Islands Council. The Council recognises that existing internal ferries use large amounts of fuel — with costs and emissions to match. If even one new vessel draws energy from a local renewable source, the potential to match up the numerous community generators with such a hefty demand would truly establish Orkney's local energy economy.

Hoprigshiels: We're building for the future

We are delighted to report that our own **joint venture wind project** with Berwickshire Housing Association reached a significant milestone in January with the first part of the access track now being laid. This 3-turbine development at Hoprigshiels Farm in the Borders will be the first windfarm developed jointly by a Housing Association and charity in the UK. Our wind farm will generate around 19gW of electricity a year providing income to support our charity work, as well as helping BHA's tenants to reduce their energy costs.

Galashiels: Go with the flow

Energise Galashiels Trust, a community group set up to encourage regeneration and development within Galashiels, have been making plans to unlock the potential of the energy held in the waterways in the Borders. The aim is to revive the caulds and mill lades of the Gala Water as an energy source for Galashiels and develop **hydro-electric generators** on the river and on the historic lades in and around the town. Analysis of the various wheel pits has revealed some possible sites for the hydro generators and renovation work will need to be carried out on the historic energy infrastructure.

Urban: Tower Power project

Community Energy Scotland is leading a hugely innovative project called **Tower Power**. This project aims to end the inequalities of pre-paid meters and insecurity arising from costly electricity in disadvantaged households. It puts communities in control of their energy, with collective bargaining power to negotiate cheaper electricity for everyone and equal tariffs. The first pilot project is at Dumbiedykes, a deprived area in urban Edinburgh with a mix of high rise and low rise housing and will demonstrate bulk-buying approach with onsite power generation, in this case using roof space for solar PV panels. We are working with <u>Comas</u>, a community development agency tackling poverty, the City of Edinburgh Council and Glasgow City Council, <u>Tempus Energy</u> and other technical and power suppliers. Tower Power will also be backed by <u>20 More</u>, a project aiming to make every household better off, so it is embedded in activity which is already tackling food poverty and welfare benefits advice.

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Measuring the social impact of Community Energy

We are working with <u>Climate XChange</u> in hosting a series of workshops to establish

a method of assessing the non-economic **social impacts of local and community energy** projects. The Orkney workshop has already taken place but we have spaces available at the following workshops (11am - 3.30pm)
